<u>Tip #8</u> - Teach Your Child How To Be A Smarter Back-To-School Shopper



School will be starting up in just a couple of weeks and it's time to start back-to-school shopping! Take the opportunity to teach your child some great financial lessons during that annual shopping trip.

Here are a few tips to get you started:

- 1. Create a budget together Sit down with your child to create a back-to-school budget. Let them know exactly how much money can be spent. Stick to only the essential purchases, which requires us to determine needs vs. wants.
- 2. Determine needs vs. wants Discuss the difference between a "need" (a \$25 Target back pack) and a "want" (a \$50 Nike back pack). Discuss whether the increase in price is worth it. Explain that purchasing the more expensive item means that they will have to cut back in other areas.
- 3. Comparison shop Encourage your kids to look through the ads for sales, clip coupons and compare prices between stores. This will help curb impulse buys and encourage your child to become a savvy shopper.
- 4. Share the savings If your child does a great job and comes in under budget, put the money they saved in a savings account for something fun.
